Chair's Report

Much was achieved this past year as we gradually emerged from the shadow of the pandemic, a journey that is not yet at its end.

Events commemorating the 15th anniversary of *Ornamentum* magazine as well as the 40th anniversary of CSDA/CCAD were held virtually and were very successful.

Adapting to the environment, our 2021 AGM and symposium were held as a hybrid event with the Saturday presentations being in-person at the Canadian Clay and Glass Gallery in Waterloo. The day included a tour and reception at the John Wissler House (1842). We thank Denis Longchamps and Wendy and Ron Cascaden for their warm hospitality. The importance of in-person events to our members was clear from those attending. The virtual auction sponsored in part by Waddington's was a great success and will be held again in conjunction with this year's symposium. As the situation has continued to improve, we have planned this year's AGM and symposium as an in-person event in Montreal September 23-25. The program is jam-packed with exceptional presentations and events. This will be a great opportunity for members to reconnect.

In our continuing effort to introduce CSDA/CCAD to a wider audience, we will host a booth at this year's Canada National Exhibition.

Making lemonade from lemons, we refined our programming to include a suite of online presentations. The formats varied and the topics were eclectic. The only constant was that they were all very well attended, in many instances by people who were introduced to CSDA/CCAD for the first time. The programming concluded for the season with an in-person members-only event hosted by Anne Greaves with a hands-on presentation by Steven Blevins, who shared some of his most treasured antique boxes. The event also featured a presentation by Nestor Golets on the history of his childhood neighbourhood of Avoca Avenue, which was the venue for the event. Stay tuned for more.

Continuing with our goal to grow and diversify our membership, our Young Professionals & Creatives committee launched its program to present contemporary perspectives in decorative arts and showcase young professionals in the creative fields. Its lectures were very engaging and attracted a wider and younger demographic. An in-person event is being planned for this fall.

Ornamentum magazine, under its editor Janna Eggebeen, and with the guidance of our Editorial Advisory Committee, contained several ground-breaking articles with original research. Its page count has increased and it includes more advertising. Ornamentum continues to be the gold standard for print publications in decorative arts and design. Look forward to upcoming issues, one of which will feature a guest

editor. A new *Ornamentum* website with a dedicated editor was launched. It features web-specific content that expands the print magazine's themes, and includes a free searchable database of *Ornamentum* articles, digitized back issues and more. The site also includes features and a series of profiles highlighting contemporary makers.

We continue to refine and expand our communications outreach to the broader public. Our quarterly electronic newsletter, with a dedicated editor, is a much anticipated must read. It is nimble and timely, complementing *Ornamentum*. Our social media presence, with a dedicated digital manager, continues to expand awareness of CSDA/CCAD and what it has to offer. Work is underway to update the CSDA/CCAD website to improve functionality and keep content current.

Our Honorary National Council has been re-engaged in providing guidance to the Board in fulfilling the objectives of CSDA/CCAD.

Memberships and subscriptions to *Ornamentum* continue to arow.

We have developed a new three-year strategic plan and are actively working on implementation.

We have completed the process to conform to the new *Ontario Not-For-Profit Corporations Act*, which you will see at the AGM in our restated articles of incorporation and a new general bylaw staggered term for directors will be proposed at this year's AGM. When fully implemented, directors will be elected for a term of two years to a maximum of three terms. Directors Robert Jordan and Rani Glick will not be seeking re-election. We thank them for their contribution to advancing CSDA/CCAD.

None of this would have been possible without the dedication and collaboration of our hard-working board and contractors as well as our many volunteers, donors and sponsors. We also benefited from additional financial support from Canadian Heritage's Periodical Fund and Canada Council for the Arts' Reopening Fund. We are sincerely grateful.

While our achievements are the work of many, some have made an extraordinary contribution not only to CSAD/CCAD but also to the wider arts and academic community. One such person is John Fleming who passed away suddenly in April. As a long-time director, past editor of and contributor to *Ornamentum* and scholar, he has left a wonderful legacy. We miss our colleague and friend and extend our deepest sympathies to his wife, Pat Fleming. In honour of John, we plan to inaugurate the John Fleming Award for critical and curatorial writing in decorative arts and design.

Treasurer's Report

Total net position on our balance sheet at year-end, March 31, 2022, is \$84,645, comprised of cash and GIC investments. This total is up from last year's year-end position of \$74,563. The Statement of Income and Expense is shown on a comparative basis to the prior year. Overall, there is a net surplus for 2021/2022 of \$8,697 compared to a net surplus for 2020/2021 of \$7,697.

Total income of \$71,493 is up from \$50,102 in 2020/2021. This increase is the result of the reinstatement of our annual symposium during COVID-19, the introduction of an online fundraising auction, increased sales of *Ornamentum* subscriptions (owing to a successful 3-year subscription campaign), and advertising sales. Our Ontario Arts Council (OAC) grant was maintained at \$2,760. CSDA/CCAD applied to the OAC for our 2022/2023 fiscal year and is waiting for confirmation. Our Canada Council for the Arts grant was maintained at \$15,200 and we still have two years left on our four-year Canada Council for the Arts grant.

Expenses for the year totaled \$62,796, up from the prior year's total of \$42,405. This increase is primarily due to the partial reinstatement of the annual in-person symposium; increased number of pages, design costs, and postage for *Ornamentum* (offset by extra advertising pages); the hiring of a new part-time administrator (2 days a week); and one-time costs associated with CSDA/CCAD's 40th anniversary.

Lastly, I would like to take this opportunity to thank Wayne Bovie, our bookkeeper, for his ongoing services.

BUDGET NOTES FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH 31, 2023

For the purpose of developing an outlook for 2022/2023, CSDA/CCAD continues to focus on the following three areas:

Magazine

CSDA/CCAD remains dependent on the continuation of government grants to fund the publication of *Ornamentum*. Grants are awarded in arrears and as such, production costs are incurred before grant certainty is confirmed.

One of the grant requirements is to increase the circulation of *Ornamentum*. CSDA/CCAD is looking into new partnerships to accomplish this in 2023. In spite of COVID-19's negative impact on many sectors, we decided to continue to print and distribute *Ornamentum* to members and subscribers – at a time when some other publishers published their magazines online only. We still plan to maintain strong ad sales and page counts of 40-44 pages for the next two issues.

Symposium

CSDA/CCAD had a hybrid symposium in 2021, with online lectures and in-person attendance for one day, and to move forward with a full in-person program for 2022 in Montreal in September with aggressive marketing to reach our pre-COVID-19 attendance figures.

Membership Support

Increased volunteer support to assist with administration of membership services will be a focus for 2022/2023. And, with the new contract administrator in place from January 2022, we hope to see an increase in growth through 2022/2023 as we implement new membership campaigns.

Overall Budget Projection

The Board of Directors, at its 21 March 2022 meeting, approved the 2022-2023 budget. The budget projects an operating increase of \$2,799. We received a COVID-19 relief grant of \$4,422 from Heritage Canada in April 2022. The Canada Council for the Arts also provided a COVID-recovery grant of \$5,000 to be applied to our September symposium in Montreal.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Governance, Nominations & Operations Committee

The Governance, Nominations & Operations Committee oversees the policies and procedures of CSDA/CCAD, providing guidance to the Board, recommending candidates to serve as Directors and Officers, and contracting for support services. It is also responsible for the organization's financial and risk management, which is addressed in the Treasurer's Report. The committee members are Henry Wiercinski, Gilles Latour, and Robert Jordan. This year the committee focused on board recruitment, updating the strategic plan, transitioning our governance documents to conform to the *Ontario Not-For-Profit Corporations Act*, implementing a staggered board, re-engaging the Honorary National Council, and contracting an administrator.

Board

The Board is a working board. Operations are effected through various committees, each chaired by a Director and supported by numerous volunteers. The success of CSDA/CCAD is dependent on their creativity, skill, and dedication.

Two Directors, Rani Glick and Robert Jordan, will not be seeking re-election. The committee solicited expressions of interest, received applications, identified qualified candidates, and interviewed them. We are pleased to have identified two candidates: Suzette Couture and Stephanie Rebick. Each brings unique skills to the Board. The remaining nine Directors wish to continue on the board.

Based on the committee's recommendation, the Board proposed for election by members as Directors at the 2022 Annual General Meeting: Suzette Couture, Susan Golets, Gilles Latour, Charlotte Mickie, Dr. Michael Prokopow, Stephanie Rebick, Julie Riches, Janice Warren, Henry Wiercinski, Erin Wiley, Anthony Wu, to serve for the terms indicated in the notice of the meeting to phase in the staggered board. Biographies of the nominees are attached to the 2021/2022 Annual Report.

Ontario Not-For-Profit Corporations Act

CSDA/CCAD is a not-for-profit corporation incorporated by letters patent in 1981 under the Ontario Corporations Act and is registered as a charity. New legislation governing not-for-profit corporations came into effect in Ontario last year. The new Ontario Not-For-Profit Corporations Act allows for a three-year phase-in period. The committee recommended and the board endorsed transitioning to the new regime by the 2022 Annual General Meeting. This transition is reflected in the amended and restated articles of incorporation and new general by-law to be submitted to members for approval at this year's AGM. Details of these changes are set out in the material sent to members with notice of the meeting.

2022-2025 Strategic Plan Overview

The Board of directors has completed a three-year strategic plan envisioning a dynamic future for CSDA/CCAD and members. CSDA/CCAD demonstrated resilience in the face of the challenges brought about by the COVID-19 pandemic affecting all Canadians. For example, the introduction of virtual monthly lectures online featured presenters from across Canada on a wide variety of topics relating to material culture and design, attracting registrants from across Canada and internationally. This virtual platform has allowed CSDA/CCAD to reach a broader audience, solicit more donations, increase memberships, and provide a forum for a greater diversity of presenters than was possible with an in-person format.

Moving forward and responding to a rapidly changing global environment, there are four areas in which the board perceives new opportunities for the organization's growth:

Implementing a Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Policy (DE&I)

CSDA/CCAD is dedicated to a policy of diversity, equity, and inclusion. CSDA/CCAD seeks to make decorative arts and design accessible to people through lectures and events, community outreach and partnerships, volunteer opportunities, and *Ornamentum* magazine and website.

Expanding Membership

A goal of CSDA/CCAD is to grow its membership to reflect national and regional representation and to include diverse cultures, perspectives and communities by expanding programming initiatives.

Internal Administration Initiatives

Investigate administrative processes to improve internal efficiencies for operations, staffing, technology potential and governance policies, and to integrate administrative systems with *Ornamentum* magazine and website.

Updating CSDA Mandate and Exploring a Name Change

CSDA/CCAD is exploring if it should engage in a wider dialogue about human-made objects and to broaden our scope to that of material culture.

CSDA/CCAD will discuss redefining its mandate and whether a new, more inclusive name will attract new members, particularly a younger and more diverse cohort, and move CSDA/CCAD into the future. We will research alternative options, including simply recommitting to our traditional focus, via a sector membership outreach.

CSDA/CCAD Website

The Communications Committee is revising the organization's current website with a focus on improving overall functionality and maintaining up to date content. A survey related to website redesign will soon be distributed. We look to relaunch the updated version of csda-ccad.org in 2024.

Management of site content is under the direction of Gilles Latour, President & Treasurer of CSDA/CCAD; Anthony Wu, Board Member; Julie Riches, Chair; and Charlotte Mickie, Vice Chair.

Ornamentum and Ornamentum.ca

Ornamentum magazine and website critically address the aesthetics, meanings, traditions, and innovations of decorative arts and design in Canada for a general audience. Dr. Janna Eggebeen continues as editor and Kaylee Maddison as online editor.

In 2021, the magazine's 15th anniversary, *Ornamentum* published a Fall/Winter issue on Mid-Century Modern Design; the theme of Spring/Summer 2022 magazine is Signals: Designs for Broadcasting. These issues featured articles in both English and French on contemporary makers, balanced with historical content, and represented Canadian decorative arts and design from across the country, from Halifax to Vancouver.

The magazine also increased from 40 to 44 pages, with more editorial content and advertising.

These two issues of *Ornamentum* contained several groundbreaking articles with original research. One of these, entitled, "Cultural Vessels: When 1960s Mi'kmaq Designs and Stories Met Traditional English Bone China," recounted the history of an Indigenous artists' collective in New Brunswick called the Micmac Indian Craftsmen. This article, by Emma Hassencahl-Perly and John Leroux, was ideal for launching an *Ornamentum* Lecture Series, which was held March 2022 and co-sponsored by the Beaverbrook Art Gallery. This series will continue with at least one co-sponsored program to follow each issue of the magazine.

The pandemic reduced newsstand sales and ended the Magazines Canada program that placed complimentary copies of *Ornamentum* in Air Canada lounges. To offset these losses, we initiated a bulk distribution program to participating businesses of the Canadian Antique Dealers Association and museum and gallery shops. Another successful promotion was a winter holiday three-year gift subscription rate, which brought in 49 new subscriptions.

Ornamentum.ca features web-specific content that expands on the print magazine's theme, includes a free searchable database of *Ornamentum* articles, digitized back issues, FAQ for article submissions, and more. Ornamentum.ca initiated a series of Profiles in November 2021 that highlights contemporary makers. The series includes Kenneth Ingniqjuk MacKay from Yellowknife, who designs and carves wood and stone uluit, the traditional Inuit women's knife; Nurielle Stern, a Toronto-based sculpture and installation artist whose medium is ceramics; Rafia Shafiq of Oakville, ON, who practices the embroidery technique of Phulkari; Stéphanie Couturier, a stained-glass artist near Edmundston, NB; and Destiny Seymour, an Anishinaabe textile and interior designer, who owns the Winnipeg-based company Indigo Arrows.

Ornamentum.ca offers content that is current and implements the organization's 2022-25 Strategic Plan objectives for its new diversity, equity and inclusion policy.

In closing, we would like to thank our fellow committee members; each has provided a wealth of ideas from which we grow. With deepest gratitude for your commitment to serve, we thank you for your time, energy, and contributions.

Program Committee

The Program Committee oversees the development of programs designed to increase the appreciation of decorative arts in Canada. Our responsibilities include developing and implementing virtual events for a national audience as well as in-person events in the greater Toronto Region annually to enhance membership, recruit new members and retain existing members; and developing and implementing strategies to broaden CSDA/CCAD's educational mandate to reach more members through digital methods, such as recording presentations for the website.

The committee had another rewarding year, building on our response to the pandemic last year by offering mostly online programming. In doing so, we were able to reach a broader audience of members and non-members from across the country and internationally to participate in our events. In fact, we increased the number of attendees from outside Canada with people joining us from 24 U.S. states, as well as the United Kingdom, Portugal, and Italy. We also were able to engage presenters who live across Canada, strengthening CSDA/CCAD as a national organization offering diverse programming to reach our goal of connecting with and showcasing material culture from all parts of the country.

The program committee maintained its four themed presentation streams—the Experts Series, Makers Series, Treasures from the Attic and the Sis Bunting Weld Private Collectors Series—and introduced a sub theme in the Experts Series: Curator's Choice. We also hosted an event under the banner Collectors at Home.

We strive to maintain a consistent schedule of hosting virtual or in-person events on the first Sunday of the month. These events, mostly held online, included:

The Experts Series: "Introducing the Arts and Craft Movement," with Dr Carl Benn

The Experts Series: "Early Electric Cars in Canada," in collaboration with the Canadian Automotive Museum, presented by Dumaresq de Pencier

The Experts Series: "What's Old is New....or is it?" with Judith Martin, Emily Hollis, and Sophie Golets

The Experts Series: "Chinese Porcelain in Canada in the 18th & 19th centuries: Featuring examples in Nova Scotia and Quebec Collections," by Asian porcelain expert Susan Lahey

The Experts Series: "Curator's Choice: Treasures from the Fashion History Museum," presented by Kenn Norman and Jonathon Walford from the Fashion History Museum

Sis Bunting Weld Private Collectors Series: "Treasure(d) Boxes," a members-only in-person event led by Steven Blevins who shared some of his most treasured boxes.

Recordings of most of the events are available on the membersonly portal.

On average, 74 members and non-members signed up for one or more of our events (registration ranged from 22 for the inperson members-only event to 126). Attendance ranged from 22 to 92. Over the course of the year, non-members signed into one or more of our events 100 times. Through this programming, we were able to recruit 15 new members, add 3 new subscribers for the magazine, and increase awareness about the organization and its value.

In conclusion, on behalf of the Program Committee, I would like to thank Susan Lahey and Julie Riches; Crafted Vancouver, Jesse LaFleur and Marion Couvreur; Lindsay Shaddy and all CSDA members who volunteered to share their seasonal treasures and stories with us in December; Dr. Carl Benn; Dumaresq de Pencier and the Canadian Automotive Museum; Judith Martin, Emily Hollis and Sophie Golets; Kenn Norman, Jonathon Walford and the Fashion History Museum; and Steven Blevins for stepping up to create and lead a presentation that has continued to enrich our lives during the ongoing pandemic. Gilles Latour, Julie Riches, and Aefa Mulholland worked behind the scenes to provide us with this much needed enrichment, so we thank them too.

In addition, and not least of all, I thank the program committee (Lindsay Shaddy, Martha Wilder, and Nestor Golets) who bring their creativity and curiosity, energy, and an element of fun to every meeting and event. It is with considerable sadness that we say good bye to Martha Wilder who is stepping down as a committee member at the end of this season. She has provided us with a wealth of context and history about CSDA/CCAD as well as access to her network of enthusiasts across the country. We will dearly miss her ideas, clever additions, and wit. She is welcome to rejoin us if she misses us as much as we will miss her.

Membership & Volunteer Committee

Statistics (to July 29th, 2022):
Overall memberships have increased by 19% in 2022 (currently at 258)
Overall subscriptions to Ornamentum have increased by 15% in 2022 (currently at 142)

MEMBERSHIP

Four new Institutional members joined in 2022 (Centre des textiles contemporain de Montréal, Craft Ontario, Musée des métiers d'art du Québec, and Switzercultcreative).

A lapsed member campaign was initiated in December 2021 and April 2022 and reinstated approximately 5% of lapsed members.

We maintained membership and subscription promotions on the Eventbrite platform used to register for our virtual talks. This form of promotion was very successful in growing new members and subscribers.

Membership in the Young Professionals & Creatives Under 40 category grew by 600% since its establishment last year (from 3 to 19 members).

Young Professionals & Creatives Committee (YP&C)

This will mark the second year into the Young Professional & Creatives Committee of CSDA/CCAD, with content made specifically to include the voices of young artists, craftspeople, designers, and academics all across Canada.

Our committee has grown this year. With this growth, our mission to present contemporary perspectives in the decorative arts and showcase young professionals in the creative fields continues through our lecture series. This year's speakers have hailed from across the decorative arts spectrum.

On February 17, we hosted Kintsugi artist and teacher Shuichi in an in-depth discussion on the history of the Japanese art of repair. Shuichi's talk highlighted a 9,000-year-old practice imbued with traditional philosophies in each of its steps and demonstrated the importance of this fascinating art in a post-pandemic world.

Gallery owner & curator Isabelle Weiss of Next:Space Detroit lectured on May 19 on "Contemporary Decorative Arts: Blurring the Line Between Art and Design." As an accredited advisor and appraiser, Isabelle demonstrated a firsthand knowledge of both the challenges and opportunities in the collecting sector of the decorative arts world. She took us on a history of design in the Michigan area (with big names like Herman Miller and Eames) and introduced our listeners to a new generation of up-and-coming artists working in ceramics, textiles, and metalwork.

This fall, YP&C intends to hold its first in-person event: an art walk based in the downtown core of Toronto's financial district. This particular area is filled with examples by leading Canadian artists but can easily be missed in the hustle and bustle of downtown life. Our aim is to introduce young professionals in the area to the art that surrounds them every day, as well as showcasing the benefits of CSDA/CCAD programming.

YP&C is an excellent opportunity to grow our membership based on the mandate in our Strategic Plan. Moving into the next year, the YP&C intends to diversify our community by engaging more students and professionals just starting out in their careers, and specifically to encourage participation from BIPOC & LGBTQ artists and makers to ensure CSDA/CCDA continues to represent all Canada has to offer. Annual Symposium

The 2021 Symposium in Waterloo, Ontario (October 1-3), was a hybrid event: part in-person and part virtual. It was remarkably successful. We would like to thank the delegates who participated in the event and would like to give a special thanks to The Canadian Clay & Glass Gallery (Denis Longchamps) for hosting, as well as Wendy and Ron Cascaden for the warm reception they provided at their 1842 John Wissler House. This year's theme is Historical and Cultural Treasures: Decorative Arts in Montréal. CNEA (Canadian National Exhibition Association)

Editorial Advisory Committee (*Ornamentum*)

The Editorial Advisory Committee (EAC) is comprised of eleven members from across Canada with deep expertise in material culture, craft and design history, museum management, and curatorial practice. The committee meets biannually with the goal of framing the thematic direction and critical content of the two-yearly issues of *Ornamentum*.

The committee, chaired by CSDA board member Dr. Michael Prokopow, was established to with the goal of honing the educational, public, and intellectual mission of the magazine with an emphasis on addressing pressing social and cultural issues attending the study of material life – of the decorative and utilitarian "arts" including, for example, issues of Indigeneity, decolonization, popular culture, and contemporary materialism and finding ways to broaden readership through changed content. The EAC has been clear in its deliberations that the magazine occupies an important place in the country but that its historical emphasis on antiques, connoisseurship, and collecting can be and should be augmented by new approaches to the study of objects of all kinds, including fashion, architecture, and industrial design.

The committee's critical engagement with the question of aiding, if not transforming Ornamentum, under the able and accomplished editorial leadership of Dr. Janna Eggebeen, has been significant. In 2021, the 15th anniversary of the publication, the Spring/Summer issue focused on questions of identity in Canada and included an interview with the late Dr. John Fleming, a long-time CSDA board member, a consideration of railway posters, and early 20 century vernacular housing design in Toronto. The Fall/Winter issue was devoted entirely to a consideration of mid-century design. This hugely successful issue offered readers a wide range of scholarly discussions about the ways modernist thinking influenced the domestic objects, and how with the "progressive" ideological character of modernity there existed interest in the visual and material culture of Indigenous people, with motifs that were often borrowed and used as adornment on mass-produced household

The May 2022 issue, with its visually sharp cover featuring a "mod" Canadian stereo unit, considered the role of objects in transmitting meanings or how all human-made entities are intentionally ascribed meaning in the process of making use. Among the articles are a consideration of the evolution of the design of radios and contemporary narrative embroidery. At the suggestion of the EAC, the next issue will feature a guest editor and will profile the writing of both established and emerging scholars working in the fields of material culture. The work of the EAC has been invaluable and has aided in maintaining the longstanding public role of *Ornamentum* and effectively framing its renewed mission and future direction.
